Grant Me Hope videos offer another way to let families know how special you are

Grant Me Hope is a recruitment opportunity that is offered to youth who have a goal of adoption. MARE partners with Grant Me Hope to produce video segments that are aired on local news stations and are featured on the Grant Me Hope website.

How Grant Me Hope videos are made

These videos are so fun to make. It starts with the production team finding a great location. We have filmed at zoos, aquariums, parks, museums and many other great places.

Your job that day would be to come prepared to answer some simple questions about yourself and to have fun! While filming, there are typically two cameras and two videographers (people who run the camera) and someone to interview you. The interviewer will ask questions that will help viewers get to know you and what type of family you are looking for.

After the interview, the videographers will film what is called B-roll, which is done by filming you while you do stuff like playing or being creative. This content fills in the video and lets the viewer see you having fun.

The great thing about these videos is that they are personal and are made to show off who you are as an individual. We captured some photos of Darion, a MARE youth shown here, during the filming of his video in June. Darion wanted to show off his artistic skills in his video, so the videographers set up their cameras in a way to see his process.

Youth board lays groundwork for change

Change is coming to the "All About Me" forms youth fill out thanks to a recent Youth Advisory Board (YAB) meeting.

Those questionnaires provide direction for writing narratives when youth are photolisted on the MARE website. However, like MARE staff, youth agree that the form needs a refresher.

As MARE Youth Specialist Gabrielle Kampsen puts it, "We want to take a fresh look at the format and how we are writing the narratives to improve the questions and get to know the youth better."

During the recent YAB meeting, youth told MARE the kinds of questions they'd like to see replaced such as their favorite color and things that make them laugh.

"They felt those questions didn't add a lot to the narrative," says Kampsen. "The youth want more questions about their preferred family structure and things geared more toward their specific interests."

So what's next in this process?


"The MARE team is going to meet and discuss what the youth thought," says Kampsen. "We'll talk about which questions to change and what we'll replace them with, then hopefully we'll implement that new questionnaire soon."

Participants: Anyone who is or has been in foster care.

Meetings: Held quarterly at locations throughout Michigan.
