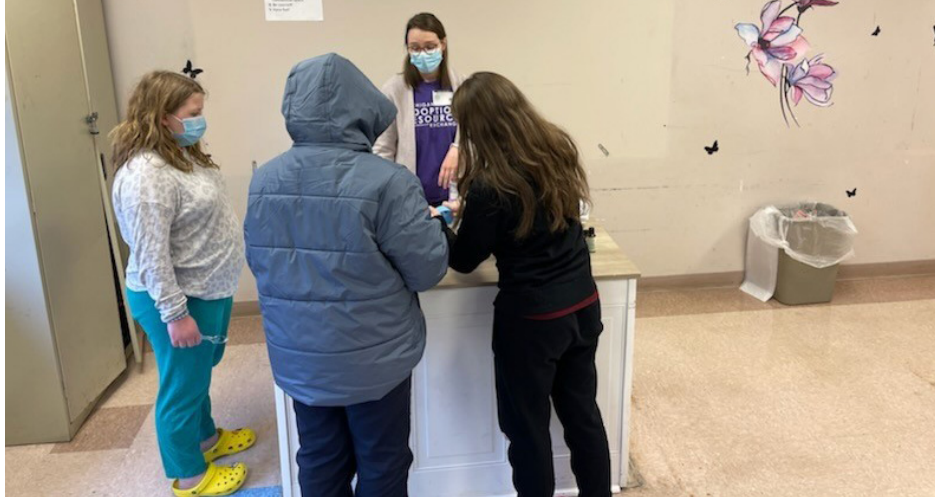

The Youth Advisory Board met recently with a group of MARE youth for fun DIY projects and conversation.

Everyone made their own DIY body scrub while talking about the importance of taking care of themselves physically by paying attention to things such as personal hygiene, exercise and eating habits. The meeting also focused on taking care of mental health by doing things such as journaling and taking time for themselves.

In addition, the group shared their thoughts on recruitment, MARE Meet & Greets and what it is like when they are meeting interested families for the first time. One youth shared that communication among youth and their team is extremely important and necessary, especially when transitioning into a home.

In-Depth Profiles (IDP's) are coming back! After a brief pause from creating these youth-led projects, MARE will be starting them again.

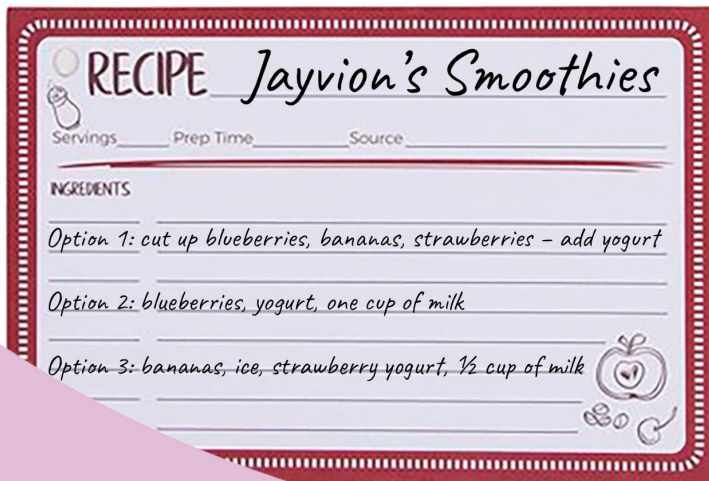
In these projects, youth dream up how they might want to express themselves, what's important to them, what they like to do and what they might want a family to know. The end result turns into videos, pictures, podcasts – really any option is on the table.

Some teens have a lot to say and want to seize a platform to share a lot about themselves with families. Others like the opportunity to share more about one of their passions

(such as Jayvion showcasing his cooking skills), and it's fun to help them create something that they can be proud of.

We keep the start of these projects intentionally open-ended, so teens can really engage with the basic questions: "What would I want to share with potential families, and how would I want to share it?"
